## **Care & Handling**

**Longevity:** Radermachera sinica is a vigorous grower and will soon grow new leaves

Pruning China Doll will keep the plant compact and beautiful

**Water requirements:** This plant tolerates the dry indoor conditions found in many homes, but appreciates regular misting of the foliage **Light:** It requires plenty of light and moisture in order to thrive Indoor plants prefer bright indirect light (avoid direct full sun) including several hours per day

Soil/Nutrition requirements: Peat moss based mix with added vermiculite

**Special care/remarks:**. Dropped leaves on China Doll are usually caused by changes in light, water or temperature

If you just brought your new houseplant home, you may see a lot of leaves falling from it

Don't worry -- it's simply adjusting to its new environment. As with most houseplants, wilted leaves indicate either lack of water or overwatering

Recent dwarf variations have been released, often referred to as the Asian Bell Tree
